

News organizations have shared more than 6,000 stories, photos and videos since AP the platform (pictured above) launched in January 2020. AP StoryShare is now being used by more than 200 news outlets in 12 states.

A new way to bolster local coverage

The Associated Press pioneered the idea of news sharing when the news cooperative was founded in 1846 by five newspapers to bring news of the Mexican-American War via Pony Express faster than ever before. More than 175 years later, the AP is again developing a tool to enable faster, stronger collaboration among news organizations and to foster local news.

AP StoryShare is a simple, quick platform for participants to share stories, photos, videos, and graphics. Users can browse or search, and download content. They can contribute as much or as little as they like, and they have complete control over what is shared. The platform provides an easy way for news outlets to connect in the shared — and critical — interest of preserving local news.
